

ARE WE SURE WE ARE 100% PRO LIFE?

The Church teaches that all life is sacred and must be cherished and protected from conception to natural death. By keeping this guiding principle in mind in reviewing all the following moral issues of today, we can quickly see what it means to be 100% Pro Life, no exceptions.

Abortion is defined as the removal of an embryo before it can survive outside the uterus. While it may not look or function completely as a baby, it is still a baby. All things are what they are at their inception. By not protecting and nurturing an embryo, we have taken the life of a little boy or girl.

Now we have to ask the difficult questions for some. While many people are against abortion in general, and still calling themselves prolife, they take exception in the following cases: rape, incest, or severe mental or physical birth defects in the unborn child. Those exceptions to abortion are not prolife, because they are not protecting *all* life. We cannot take the life of any unborn child, regardless of their condition or the circumstances of their conception. The child is innocent, created by God in his image, and deserving of God’s plans for his life here on earth.

OUR FRIENDS THE SAINTS

Saints Timothy and Titus—From the epistles of St. Paul we learn about life in the early Church. In his letters to the Corinthians and in 1 & 2 Timothy and Titus, we know that Timothy and Titus were both very close to St. Paul.

Timothy was born in Lystra. His father was a Gentile, his mother Eunice was Jewish, and his grandmother Lois was the first in the family to convert to Christianity. Timothy met Paul when Paul came to preach at Lystra. The son of a “mixed marriage”, Timothy had not been circumcised. When Timothy became a Christian Paul allowed him to be circumcised to placate the Jewish Christians. (Acts 16:3) Replacing Barnabas, Timothy became Paul’s close friend and confidant and accompanied him on his second missionary journey. In time he was sent to Thessalonica to encourage the persecuted Christians there, and his report to Paul led to Paul’s first letter to the Thessalonians. Timothy was in Rome with Paul when Paul was imprisoned and was himself imprisoned but later released. Tradition says that he went to Ephesus, became its first Bishop and was stoned to death in 97 for opposing pagan worship.

Titus was a Greek, probably from Antioch who was a convert of Paul. Titus was not circumcised because it had been decided at the Council in Jerusalem that baptized Gentiles were not subject to the Mosaic Law. Paul sent Titus to Corinth twice, first to take care of some problems of scandal and of dissension in the Church and a second time to take up a collection for the poor Christians in Jerusalem. Paul preached in Crete for a while, but when called away he ordained Titus to take his place. It is in Paul’s letter to Titus that Paul instructs Titus on how a bishop should conduct himself and shepherd his flock. Their memorial is January 26.
